Jubilee Year 2025: Pilgrims of Hope



This year, students and staff across our Trust have celebrated the Jubilee Year 2025, Pilgrims of Hope – a call for us to share Christian hope in a world facing war, poverty, climate change and postpandemic challenges in a range of creative and spiritual ways.

Cathedral Pilgrimages

St. Teresa's Year 5 pupils, embarked on an inspiring visit to Nottingham Cathedral and The Mary Potter Heritage Centre, where they explored the spiritual significance of the Cathedral through a guided tour and participated in the Jubilee Pilgrim Trail.

Holy Trinity also embraced the pilgrimage spirit. Their Year 5 children visited the Cathedral, learning about its history and restoration. They were particularly moved by the story of Mary Potter's unwavering faith, explored during their visit to the Heritage Centre.





The Jubilee Icon Pilgrimage

In July, schools and central teams across our Trust took part in a special pilgrimage with the Travelling Created by Ethiopian artist Mulugeta Araya, the icon reflects both the Church's global unity and Ethiopia's rich tradition of sacred art.

It journeyed from school to school and across our Trust, including a stop at Nottingham Cathedral, allowing all to embrace the themes of Encounter, Discipleship and Missionary Discipleship that underpin our shared vision.

Jubilee Retreats

At St. Edmund Campion, pupils took part in a 'Pilgrims of Hope' retreat led by school chaplains. Students explored the meaning behind the Jubilee Year logo, and Year 6 were challenged to create their own school-inspired versions. The winning designs are radiant beacons of hope, capturing the spirit of community and renewal.





St. Mary's, Boston SAT scores soar!

ollowing a strategic review and the launch of their spiral curriculum, Year 6 SAT results at St. Mary's, Boston, have soared this year!

Achievement in Maths has increased from 65% to an outstanding 97% and is likely to place St. Mary's in the top 15-20% of schools, once national results are released in September.

Reading results have also increased significantly from 65% to 83% and writing from 65% to 79%.

This progress is particularly notable given that 78% of pupils speak English as an additional language.

A huge congratulations to everyone at St. Mary's for these incredible results!



Father Michael's 55 years of Service

pupils at Holy Trinity, Newark and St. Joseph's, Boughton celebrated Father Michael O'Donoghue's Emerald Jubilee, the 55th Anniversary of his ordination earlier this month.

Alongside members of their parish, the two schools came to together for a special Mass of celebration for Father Micheal.

Pupils at St. Joseph's decorated and presented a stole for him to wear during the service and the Holy Trinity choir entertained at a special jubilee party for parishioners.





Students lead our Trust green mission

The council discussed what environmental and sustainability issues are most important to their school community and shared some ideas about projects we could do as a Trust.


School action plans

Children from the Holy Trinity Eco and Chaplaincy Teams shared their Climate Change Action Plans with parishioners at a special Ecothemed Sunday Mass. The event followed an inschool Eco Retreat Day, where pupils reflected on the plans and made their Jubilee Pledges linked to the Trust's eco themes.



No Mow May

Many of our schools participated in No Mow May this year and left lawns and grassed areas untouched to let wildflowers grow. Allowing grass and wildflowers to grow benefits wildlife, tackles pollution and helps lock away carbon underground. Some schools have decided to keep these areas unmown year-round as a habitat for wildlife.



Solar Panels

This year, solar panels were installed at St. Bede's and St. Bernadette's to help the schools become more energy efficient and contribute to wider environmental goals.

The project has been made possible thanks to North Lincolnshire Community Energy, supported by North Lincolnshire Council. NLCE is a community benefit society that funds renewable energy projects across the area.

They join five other Trust schools who also have solar panels and are able to cut carbon emissions and reduce energy costs.

Empowering education: Our AI Charter

This month, we proudly launched our AI Charter which sets out clear principles for the safe, ethical, and purposeful use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in our schools.

Designed collaboratively with input from staff across our schools and the central Trust team, the Charter aims to support colleagues in navigating AI confidently and practically.

we welcome the positive impact of Al. When used responsibly and ethically, AI can improve teaching, learning and school operations. It helps staff work more efficiently and allows for more personalised and inclusive support for students.

To mark the launch, we hosted a special event where staff explored the Charter's vision and how to use AI safely and effectively in their role.

The community at Saint Mary's in Boston were delighted to welcome Bishop Patrick to their school on Friday 13th July for a Mass of celebration in regard to their achievement of the CAFOD Live Simply award. Many special guests also attended, both from the Nottingham Diocese and the Our Lady of Lourdes Academy Trust. The pupils read and sang beautifully, and it was a wonderful occasion! Whilst at Saint Mary's, Bishop Patrick also blessed a newly developed space in school and unveiled it as 'The Jubilee Room'. This special day truly celebrated the efforts of the whole community and recognised their ongoing commitment towards living simply, sustainably and in solidarity.

Year 5 at Saint Augustine's in Stamford held a scavenger hunt on the school field this term and joined up with the EYFS children to follow clues and collect letters which ultimately spelt out a phrase linked to the Jubilee Year; 'Pilgrims of Hope'.
